accredited challengers. A majority of election judges may limit the number of non-accredited challengers in the polling place.

Electioneering

No electioneering, political activity, or posting or distributing of campaign materials may take place within 100 feet of the entrance and exit to the polling place. Throughout the day, monitor the activity outside the polling place and instruct anyone electioneering within 100 feet to stay outside the marked boundary. If the individual persists, call local law enforcement and request that the individual be moved outside the 100-foot boundary or removed from the property.

What constitutes electioneering is broadly interpreted and includes wearing any clothing that supports or opposes a candidate, ballot issue, or political party. It does not include a voter wearing a shirt, button, or the like with a political message who is on his or her way into the polling place or in the polling place to vote. A voter is allowed to wear clothing, buttons, or the like with a political message but is not allowed to linger in the polling place or within the 100-foot boundary.

Media

With the approval of both chief judges, representatives of the media are permitted to use cameras in a polling place and within the 100-foot "no electioneering" zone. Monitor the representatives of the media to ensure that they do not interfere with the voting process and do not jeopardize the privacy of the voters.

Exit Polling

Organizations sometimes conduct "exit polling" to gather information about how individuals voted. Exit polling is a constitutionally protected activity and is permitted within the 100-foot boundary.

Any individual conducting exit polling must comply with the following rules:

- 1. Stay outside the polling room;
- 2 Do not ask questions until after the voter has voted and left the polling room;
- 3. Inform voters that participation is voluntary; and
- 4. Do not electioneer within the 100-foot boundary.
